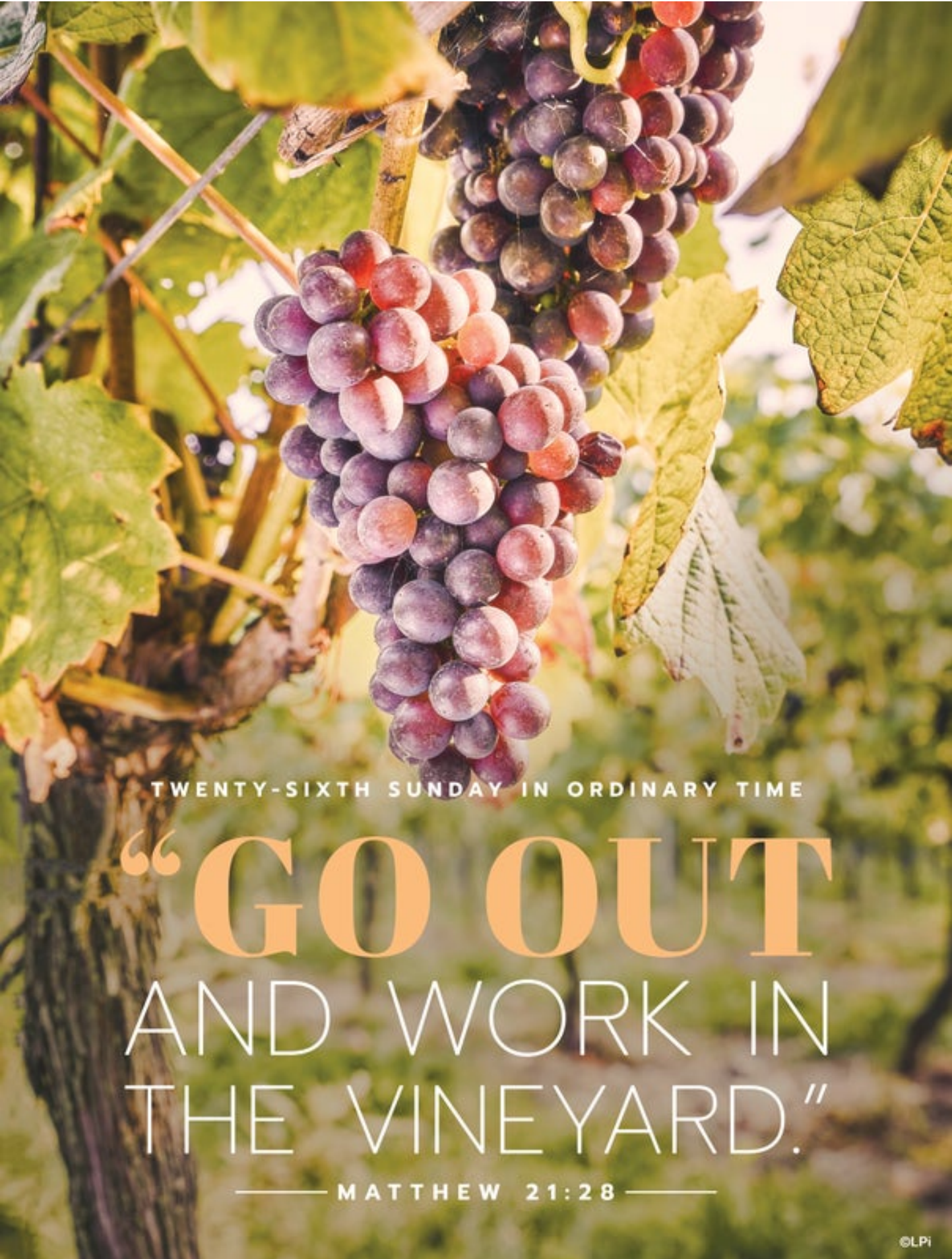

Parenting Pointers: May has Mother's Day and June has Father's Day. Did you know that the 4th Monday in September (September 28th this year) is Family Day? Relax, there are no gifts to buy or cards to send, simply eat dinner with your family on this day. Maybe you do this regularly anyway. Good. If not, try to do it more often. Some families have each person share a high and a low of the day during dinner.

A Family Perspective: In today's Gospel, Jesus asks, "What is your opinion?" We often mistake our opinions for dogma or fact, but they are merely our perceptions or feelings about a situation. Arguments over opinions can cause significant divides in families. Tread lightly on the opinions of others; the heart you break may be your own.

LET US LEARN TO SAY YES TO GOD

We've heard the old saying, and most of us would agree, *actions speak louder than words*. We may, at times, catch ourselves saying yes to things we really are not able to actually do. For example: "I'll call you" OR "Let's get together sometime" OR "We'll talk more about that later."

We had good intentions in following through but got too involved in a situation or project at work, issue in the family, or worse yet, we did not carve out some time to make contact and keep that commitment. And sometimes the disparity between what people say and what they do, causes great harm. Take for example the marriage vows that are spoken and then broken. This can break hearts.

Yes and no are small words but they are a powerhouse in our vocabulary. Yes is an agreement to a fact, deed, or a relationship. No is a refusal to accept an act or commitment.

The follow through of a yes, in obedience to their father, from two sons, is the theme of our Gospel...The father came to the first son and said; "Son, go out and work in my vineyard today." What was his response? "I will not." But, he regretted it and went out to the vineyard after he thought about it.

Then, the father went to the other son and gave him the same order. What was his response? "Yes sir" but he did not go. In both cases, the two sons' actions spoke louder than their words. The first son, to his benefit; the second son, to his disobedience, to their father. There may have been times in life that we were like either son when we said no but then obeyed God OR said yes but did NOT.

My brothers and sisters, if we take the time, even if it's only once a week, to thank God for the many blessings and answered prayers that we have received in our lives, then we will be able to say YES to God when He shows us the work we are to do for Him in this life. If we hesitate, or even say no at first, then at least we need to be like the first son in today's Gospel, and go back to our Lord in honest prayer and say YES.

Say yes today!!

The Liturgy of Hours (Part One)

For many centuries, the Church has prayed "**The Liturgy of Hours.**" These prayers are mostly prayed by professed religious men, called "**monks,**" in monasteries, priests, and professed religious sisters called "**nuns,**" in convents.

The Liturgy of Hours consists of seven hours, or times, during the day. The first one is called **Invitatory Psalm**. This prayer is prayed by the religious community at 3:00 AM or at dawn. Oftentimes, the Office of Readings may accompany the Invitatory Psalm. The Office of Readings is mostly sermons from the Saints and Readings from both the Old and New Testament of the Bible. Many times, the sermons are a teaching on the Sacred Scripture Passage given for that day.
