Our Invitation for Joy

You have just received a beautiful Christmas card from a relative you haven't seen in years. You feel joy. You are filled with joy and relief when a friend sends you a text message that all of their medical tests are very good. A person that you know, who has been struggling to find employment, has now posted on Facebook that they were offered a job out of town in a career they have always wanted. You and others share in his joy.

The theme on this Third Sunday of Advent is the joy we anticipate of Christ's Coming at Christmas. As we can be filled with joy by someone's thoughtfulness toward us and by our sharing in other's joy, so too, is our joy heightened this week of Advent.

Traditionally, this Third Sunday of Advent has been called Gaudete Sunday. Gaudete is Latin for rejoice. The First Reading, Psalm Response, and Second Reading at Mass speak of joy, rejoicing, and gladness we find in the following brief excerpts:

> "Shout for joy, O daughter Zion!" "The Lord, Your God, is in your midst, a mighty Savior; He will rejoice over you with gladness." (Zep 3: 14-18a) "Cry out with joy and gladness." (Is 2: 2-3, 4, 5-6) "Rejoice in the Lord always. I shall say it again: rejoice!" (Phil 4: 4-7)

This is wonderful, but for someone who is going through stressful, anxiety-filled situations in life, grief, sadness, and possibly anger; they may ask the following question...

How will I experience joy? Ask our Lord Jesus to come gently into my thoughts and feelings as I ask for His Peace to replace this inner struggle. The above Reading from Philippians Chapter 4 verses 4-7 can help.

First, please know that Jesus (Emmanuel) is with you in your suffering. This name, Emmanuel, means God is with us.

Second, know that you are not alone. Pray for someone you know that is going through some difficulty, whether it be similar to your situation or not, and know someone is praying for you.

Third, slowly pray the following words, which is a continuation of the above quote of St. Paul in his Letter to the Philippians...

"Your kindness should be known to all. The Lord is near. Have no anxiety at all, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, make your requests known to God. Then, the peace of God that surpasses all understanding will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus."

Las Posadas (means "Inns" or "Lodging") The Las Posadas religious festival is celebrated in Mexico and some parts of the United States. This festival starts on December 16th and concludes on December 24th. Las Posadas commemorates the long journey that Joseph and Mary made from Nazareth to the town of Bethlehem, in search of a safe refuge, where Mary could give birth to the baby Jesus.

Las Posadas celebration has four main parts to it. First is the prayer, then the caminata (singing during a long procession), food, and lastly the piñata. Mary, Joseph, and other people in the celebration make their way, walking through a garden while singing traditional songs of the celebration. Next, there is a dinner of the traditional food and beverage for the people participating in Las Posadas.

At the conclusion of Las Posadas, there is the breaking of the piñata. The piñata is a donkey-shaped figure, made out of paper-mâché, hung from a rope, stuffed with candy and other sweet goodies. A person is chosen to break it with a stick. They put a blindfold on and someone slowly turns the person around three times. Then, they are to figure out where the piñata is hanging and they start swinging at it in order to break it. When the piñata is broken, the candy is shared with everyone. The most important part of Las Posadas is that Mary and Joseph are given a spacious stable to stay as they await the birth of Jesus our Savior. (from: https://www.britannica.com>topic Las Posadas)
