Child Protection and Creating Safe Environments

Bullying is defined as any unwanted aggressive behavior by another youth or group of youths that involves an observed or perceived power imbalance and is repeated multiple times or is highly likely to be repeated. 20% of youth ages 12-18 experience bullying. When adults respond quickly to bullying behavior, they send the message that bullying is not acceptable. There are ways parents can make a positive difference. Parents can educate themselves on the signs that a child is being bullied or is a bully. Parents should keep the lines of communication open with their child and model for their child how to treat others. During this month of November, I will continue to share with you great Christian examples of holy people who are saintly and those who are actually on their way to sainthood by being canonized a saint by the pope. One such person who is on her way to becoming a saint is Michelle Duppong.

Michelle was born in Haymarsh, North Dakota, where she was raised on her family farm. From a young age, her life was plowing, gardening, and canning. She has five siblings who, along with Michelle, were taught by their parents to work hard, but to also enjoy life. Michelle did indeed live life to the fullest. The greatest gift her parents taught her and her siblings is to love Jesus our Lord and their Catholic faith.

Michele loved her farming background so much that she majored in horticulture when she went to school at North Dakota State University. Michelle was an excellent student and always gave 100% in her studies and toward the people in her life, as well as in the service activities that she belongs to. The ministry outreach missionary program that Michelle joined during her junior year at the university is FOCUS (Fellowship of Catholic University Students).

After she graduated, she worked as a missionary with FOCUS and inspired many young people in their life's vocation. She was also instrumental in bringing students to embrace the Catholic faith. A friend of Michelle, who worked with her in FOCUS, said of her that she always made time to be with people who were in great need of someone to talk to and be present to them. She enjoyed meeting new people and inviting them into a deeper relationship with Jesus. Michelle eventually became the director of adult faith formation in the Diocese of Bismarck, ND.

In 2014, Michelle was diagnosed with cancer, and passed away on Christmas Day, 2015, at the age of 31. Friends of Michelle and others have been asking for her intercessory prayers. She wrote a letter to Jesus our Lord a few months before she died, thanking Him for His Mercy. She wrote; "if you take me home soon, please fill my family and friends, along with the multitudes who have been lifting me up in prayer, with joy and peace, knowing that Your Love wins in the end." Bishop Kagan, of that diocese, said that "what I remember best of Michelle was her abiding love for the Mass." He also said that, "wherever she went around our diocese, she wanted only to help others love Jesus and the Church, and in it, to find their true home."
